KINGCOMBE MEADOWS

Spanning the full width of the valley of the River Hooke, around the hamlet of Lower Kingcombe, lies Kingcombe Meadows, a striking tract of unspoilt countryside. Nearby is the equally unspoilt ancient woodland area of Powerstock Common nature reserve. These combined regions total around 300 ha (741 acres) and offer the visitor a wonderful opportunity to explore remote, quiet parts of west Dorset. A day visit will give you a taste of the locality but if you wish to stay longer, accommodation is available at The Kingcombe Centre set in the middle of Kingcombe Meadows, together with a café serving locally sourced food. (Cafe open Fri - Sun 10am - 4pm and all week in the school holidays). Check out events, activities, workshops and courses at The Kingcombe Centre www.kingcombe.org

Wildlife interest: Typical wildflowers in woodland & marshy areas. The grassy meadows support many common species & also lady's mantle, corkyfruited water dropwort, pepper saxifrage, devil's-bit scabious & knapweed. Butterflies include varieties of skipper & fritillaries. Birds abound with visiting summer warblers and woodland birds.

POWERSTOCK COMMON

Powerstock Common nature reserve has a mixture of habitats including woodland with open grassy areas along the line of the disused Maiden Newton to Bridport railway line as well as interesting hedgebanks and numerous small ponds. Superb views can be glimpsed of Dorset's coastline. Much of the reserve is accessible for the less able as a wide hard track runs through the centre of the reserve. A nature trail is waymarked (uneven surface).

Wildlife interest: Resident woodland bird species include nuthatch & great spotted woodpecker together with a number of migrants such as willow warbler and chiffchaff. Fallow deer may be seen within the woodland. Wildflowers include bluebell, pendulous sedge, bee orchid, rock rose, dyers greenweed and devil's-bit scabious. Speckled wood and wood white, marsh fritillary and brown argus butterflies. Superb for newts and dragonflies in the ponds.

ACCESS

Kingcombe Meadows

There are two marked trails across the reserve which can be followed as a short circular walk in the centre of the reserve or as a longer circular walk (see map overleaf).

There is also an exploration area, suitable for tramper vehicles, when ground conditions allow.

Parking available at The Kingcombe Centre (map ref SY555991 & map ref SY554990) & Copse Close (map ref ST554006).

Powerstock Common via Kingcombe Meadows

The reserve may be reached on foot using both public footpaths and country lanes.

By car from Kingcombe - on the lane between Lower Kingcombe and Toller Porcorum is a signpost for Powerstock. Take this and then take the first (unsignposted) lane. At a T junction turn left downhill, under a disused railway bridge and Powerstock Common car park is on the right, map ref. SY 547974.



GETTING THERE

By train: Services are infrequent and require planning ahead. Useful information can be viewed at www.transportdirect.info. Train stations:

4 miles from Maiden Newton (Bristol to Weymouth line)

12 miles from Dorchester South (London Waterloo to Weymouth line)

9 miles from Crewkerne (London Waterloo to Exeter St. David's line)

By car: from the A356, take the turning to Toller Porcorum. In the village, turn right, signposted Hooke & Lower Kingcombe.


By bicycle: Plans are underway to establish a traffic-free bike/walkers path along the 10 miles of disused railway line running from Maiden Newton to Bridport. The old line runs along the southern edge of Kingcombe Meadows & the northern edge of Powerstock Common nature reserves.


By foot: public footpaths/bridleways cross the reserve including 2 long distance trails, the Wessex Ridgeway & Jubilee Trail.
