Role Title:

Practical Conservation & Engagement Trainee – Wiltshire, South

Based at:

Wiltshire Wildlife Trust - Langford Lakes Nature Reserve, Duck St, Salisbury SP3 4NH

Mentor:

Type of work the role will be involved with:

This placement will focus on WWT's suite of reserves in the south of the county, with a base at our flagship reserve in the Wylye Valley, Langford Lakes. These reserves, many of which are designated as Sites of Special Scientific Interest, support a range of habitats, including unimproved flower-rich grassland, ancient woodland, lakes and wetlands. The trainee will also get the opportunity to work on other reserves in mid and North Wiltshire alongside Reserves and Estates staff.

The trainee will gain experience of:

- Scrub clearance, tree felling and coppicing
- Reserve infrastructure work and site maintenance, including fencing
- Livestock and grassland management
- Survey and monitoring
- Working with and leading volunteers from a wide range of backgrounds
- Community engagement, including guided walks and events
- Media and communication skills
- Health and safety, e.g. risk assessments

All trainees will receive training in key skills, such as time management, personal effectiveness, job applications and interview techniques.
