Gifts in wills protect Dorset's wildlife and wild places

We rely on donations

As a small charity independent of government funding, we rely on donations from people like you, to continue our vital conservation work across Dorset. Wardens and dedicated volunteers work

hard to maintain our nature reserves for everyone to enjoy. But managing over 40 reserves isn’t cheap. **Every year, this work costs over £750,000.** A gift in your will could pay for essential tools, equipment and people to enable the creation and maintenance of habitats to protect precious wildlife. Or help us secure new sites, where nature can thrive.

Gifts in wills make a huge impact

You can see for yourself the impacts of gifts left in wills across Dorset. Such gifts have enabled us to purchase land at our Kingcombe National Nature Reserve, as well as Lorton Meadows nature reserve. We were also able to kickstart our pioneering rewilding project at Wild Woodbury, thanks to gifts in wills.

Help protect the nature you love

Your act of generosity will ensure that we are able to continue managing our nature reserves, standing up for wildlife, and educating and inspiring people to love nature as much as you do.

Remembering Dorset Wildlife Trust in your will is easy

Writing a will provides peace of mind, knowing that your assets will be distributed according to your wishes. It can also help reduce the amount of tax payable on your estate. If you choose to leave a gift to Dorset Wildlife Trust in your will, it will not be included when valuing your estate for tax purposes.

It doesn't have to be complicated

If you already have a will and would like to make some small changes, you can add a codicil to your existing will and send it to your solicitor. A codicil is a document which allows you to make changes or additions to an existing will, and must be read in conjunction with it.

To make a new will, or update an existing one, we advise that you speak to a solicitor. We are unable to provide specific legal advice but would love to speak to you about how your gift could be used to protect wildlife.

There are three types of gift that you can leave to Dorset Wildlife Trust

- A share of your estate. This is a percentage of your estate after all other gifts and expenses have been paid. These gifts are very important to us as they usually maintain their value or increase over time. This also means you're less likely to need to amend it in the future. Also known as a residuary gift.
- A specific sum. This is a gift of a set amount of money. Also known as a pecuniary gift.
- A specific item. This could be something valuable that we could sell.

Examples of legal wording that you can use when making your will

If you've decided to remember Dorset Wildlife Trust in your will, you can take the following wording to your solicitor. They will make sure your will is valid and that your wishes are followed.

A share of your estate:

My bequest to Dorset Wildlife Trust of the residual estate (or a proportion of) – a residuary or percentage legacy: “Subject to the payment of my debts, funeral and testamentary expenses, I give the whole (residuary) or ___% of my estate not otherwise disposed of by this my will to Dorset Wildlife Trust (registered charity number 200222) of Brooklands Farm, Forston, Dorchester, Dorset DT2 7AA, for the general purposes of Dorset Wildlife Trust and I declare that the receipt of their Treasurer or other proper officer shall be a full and sufficient discharge.”

A specific sum of money:

My bequest to Dorset Wildlife Trust for a set sum – a pecuniary legacy: “I give free of tax to Dorset Wildlife Trust (registered charity number 200222) of Brooklands Farm, Forston, Dorchester, Dorset DT2 7AA, the sum of £___ for the general purposes of Dorset Wildlife Trust and I declare that the receipt of their Treasurer or other proper officer shall be a full and sufficient discharge.”

Make your will for free

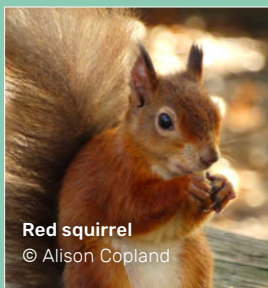
Did you know?

75p of every £1 donated to us directly funds vital conservation work.

Over the last five years, 12% of our overall funding has come from gifts in wills.

Leaving a gift to Dorset Wildlife Trust in your will is an important decision. To anyone considering leaving a gift in your will, we promise that:

We will treat you fairly and won't intrude on your privacy

The decision to leave a gift in your will is personal to you. We will never pressure you but from time to time, may be in touch with updates on our work and invitations to events. There is no obligation for you to let us know if you have left a gift in your will. However, if you would like to do so, it allows us to recognise your pledge and thank you for your generous support.

We promise to use your gift wisely, in line with your wishes

Should you wish to discuss your gift and how it might benefit wildlife and wild places in Dorset, we would be very pleased to speak to you before you write or update your will. This enables us to have an open conversation about how your gift might be used, and to ensure that your wishes can be upheld.

You are entitled to change your will, as and when you want to

We understand that circumstances change and there may be a time where you need to take us out of your will. Many people elect to review their will at important points in their life such as buying property, getting married, or having children and grandchildren. Should you choose to take us out of your will, there is no obligation to let us know. However, by doing so, we can ensure that our records are kept up to date and that we do not contact you unnecessarily.

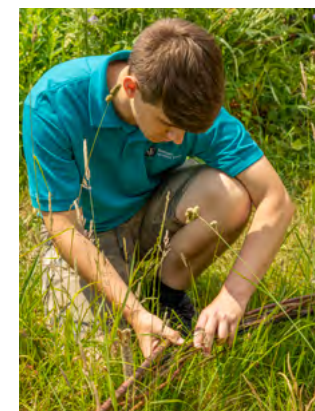
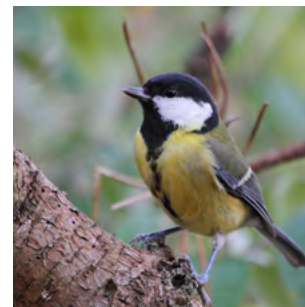
