

## About Dorset Wildlife Trust

Dorset Wildlife Trust is the leading charity dedicated to nature conservation in Dorset. From small beginnings in 1961 based entirely on voluntary effort, we now have over 27,000 members, 42 nature reserves, four visitor centres, one conservation centre and a thriving programme of outreach with communities.

Kingcombe Visitor Centre is the gateway to the stunning Kingcombe National Nature Reserve, incorporating Kingcombe Meadows and Powerstock Common nature reserves. Kingcombe Meadows is a traditional working farm complete with flowerrich grassland, ancient hedgerows, rough pasture and wet woodlands. The hedgerows, fields and hay meadows are almost untouched by artificial fertilisers and pesticides. As a result, they are home to a huge array of wildlife, some common and easy to see, others rare elsewhere in the UK.

The grounds of the visitor centre provide a snapshot of Kingcombe's varied habitats, making Kingcombe a brilliant location for school groups. Nestled in the heart of 450 acres of nature reserve, the visitor centre provides easy access to a multitude of habitats, ideal for enriching the lives of young people.



## The Facilities

The visitor centre contains displays about Kingcombe's wildlife and history. Swallow Barn is our dedicated meeting space, perfect for classroom use and provides space for groups to have refreshments and/or lunch. Swallow Barn can be configured to meet the needs of your group. The toilets and hand washing facilities are conveniently located to the rear of Swallow Barn. There is free parking for a limited number of cars and/or a minibus is available on site. Due to our rural location, we cannot accommodate coaches.

# The Visit

Educational visits last between two hours or a full day for all Key Stages. You are welcome to eat your lunch on site, but please take your litter away with you. Our learning programme supports the requirements of the National Curriculum. If you can't find an activity to meet the needs of your group, please contact us to discuss your topic. We supply all the equipment necessary for the activities, including age-appropriate worksheets and ID guides.
